Chairman's Report

This is my fourth year as Chairman of the Trust. It continues to be a privilege to serve the historic churches, chapels and meeting houses of Worcestershire and Dudley in this way. The Trust makes grants to assist with a wide variety of repair works, thus helping to keep these buildings at the heart of their communities, both as valued places of worship and reflection, as well as important landmarks in both townscape and countryside. This work continues to be vital at a time when many churches find it increasingly difficult to stay open, running and well maintained. The economic situation has continued to be uncertain and difficult, so there is ever increasing pressure for assistance on limited financial resources and grant making bodies such as ours. However, this trust continues to support places of worship as far as possible and our grants for the year are listed in this annual report. 2010 saw the launch of the National Churches Trust's partnership grant scheme, and this trust was fortunate enough to be allocated £20,000 for distribution during 2011 in Worcestershire and Dudley based on agreed criteria in conjunction with some of our own grants, and these are also listed in this annual report. We continue to contribute financially towards the post of Heritage Buildings and Community Development Officer in Worcester Diocese. Our support for this valuable work, on which we are regularly updated, is helping to secure increased use and better care of church buildings. Prevention of decay through effective maintenance remains a better solution for our churches than having to find expensive cures through restoration.

The Trust is indeed fortunate to be served by diligent and enthusiastic trustees and officers, and it is a pleasure for me to take this opportunity to thank them all once again. However, I would particularly like to thank John Davies our Secretary and Jean Crabbe our Treasurer, who both do such vital hard work to ensure we can function efficiently and effectively. Jacci Hunt has also continued to provide expert secretarial support with meetings and the annual report, and I am most grateful for this.

'Ride and Stride' remains our main fundraising event, and I would like to thank John and Jean Colley along with Helen Peberdy for all they do to collate and distribute paperwork and forms, organise the day in September, and process both forms and collected funds afterwards. We are always keen for more people to support the work of the Trust through 'Ride and Stride' in whatever way they feel able. If cycling is not for you, then contributions on foot and horseback, amongst other interesting modes of getting around, are extremely welcome, and of course sponsoring the participants or ensuring churches are open and welcoming on the day are also vital roles in the event!

Haydn Rhodes and Jan Gill organised their first very successful car tours last June and July to two groups of delightful medieval churches around Bredon Hill with excellent teas. Look out for details of the 2012 tours. The coach tour in August was to a number of historic churches in Birmingham, most of which had at one time been in Worcestershire before the villages of Northfield, Kings Norton and Yardley were enveloped within the city. By contrast the 2012 August coach tour will be to Herefordshire. In October Annette Leech and I led a walk around some of the historic and less well known places of worship in Malvern, where we saw the buildings of several non-conformist denominations before partaking of tea at Holy Trinity, Link Top. Next October we look forward to a visit to Bromsgrove. Steve and Carol Dowling have continued to help with bookings and arrangements for these tours and I offer them my sincere thanks.

During the Worcester Festival on Wednesday 17th August we held a reception at St George's Church, Barbourne, Worcester, where Friends of the Trust joined trustees, and a number of interested members of the public, to view some of the recent restoration work at this wonderful Arts and Crafts church, which had been assisted by the Trust, and to hear more about the work and achievements of the Trust.

Further details of all our events are posted on our website which is at present at http://worcestershirechurches.blogspot.com/, but as this is shortly to be updated the site can also be accessed via a link on the National Churches Trust website at www.nationalchurchestrust.org. We are most grateful to Annette Leech for all she does to enhance and update our site. Please visit it to see information on the work of the Trust and sources of funds, as well as historic pictures of local churches and links to other useful websites.

Some four times a year I attend meetings in London of the Historic Churches Liaison Group (HCLG), which I currently chair and on which I have represented this trust and those of Staffordshire, Herefordshire and Shropshire. These meetings and the annual conference hosted by the National Churches Trust, which was in Llandaff Cathedral, have enhanced the links between the Worcestershire and Dudley Historic Churches Trust and other county and national churches trusts during the year.

There is of course so much more we can all do to help historic churches in Worcestershire and Dudley. In the future you may consider making a bequest to the Trust; we have distributed funds from our first ever legacy during the past year to help historic churches in need of restoration. By becoming a Friend and encouraging others to do the same, or by making a donation to the Trust, using the form at the back of this report, you will help the Trust with its valuable work. Please support 'Ride and Stride' in September and other Trust events.

St Andrew, Ombersley

It was particularly significant that during 2011 the Trust was able to support restoration work at this church to the sum of £10,000, as it included £5000 in the form of the Trust's first partnership grant received from the National Churches Trust. These funds have assisted towards the cost of vital repairs to the stonework, windows and drainage systems of this imposing and extraordinary estate church in one of Worcestershire's most attractive villages.

St Andrew's Church is one of the finest surviving works by the Birmingham architect, Thomas Rickman. It was constructed between 1825 and 1829 to the cost of some £18,000 for the Sandys family of Ombersley Court. Rickman was a serious student of Gothic architecture and his terms of Early English, Decorated and Perpendicular styles continue to be used to this day. St Andrew's is in the fourteenth century Decorated style, but Rickman's innovative architecture included extensive use of ironwork which became popular at the time of the Industrial Revolution, but which has also led to severe subsequent deterioration of the masonry. The church has an imposing west tower and spire which dominate the village, and these are attached to a substantial aisled nave and chancel.

Much of the interest in this church lies in its interior which remains much as it was originally designed by Rickman. The pulpit, organ and box pews survive, as does the family pew of Lord Sandys, complete with fireplace. The Commandment Boards and Lord's Prayer can still be seen in the chancel, and the unusual patterned stained glass is all contemporary. It is a remarkable period piece. However, we are reminded of the earlier history of the site through the survival of the chancel of the old church and medieval cross a short distance to the south across the churchyard. The chancel is the mausoleum of the Sandys family, and contains memorials to members of the family who built the nineteenth century church.

The Trust is pleased to support the restoration of St Andrew's in the form of this partnership grant with the National Churches Trust, so that it continues to thrive at the heart of this village. It is important for the Worcestershire and Dudley Historic Churches Trust to continue such vital work helping to preserve places of worship throughout the area.

The July tour started at St. Peter, Little Comberton which retains several Norman features. Next stop was St. Mary, Wick which has a Norman font and several windows by Charles Eamer Kempe. St. John the Baptist, Fladbury is a fine example of the work of Frederick Preedy and has several medieval monuments. Then on to St. Michael, Cropthorne with its splendid Norman arcades and a spectacular monument to the Dingley family. A fine tea was provided at the converted tithe barn at Charlton.

We would like to thank Mr. Grubb our peripatetic organist who creates a welcoming atmosphere at each church. Also, we are grateful for the cooperation of the vicars, and church wardens involved and the ladies who provide the teas. Finally, thank you for the support of our 'tourists'!

We were fascinated by the stories behind the foundation of these buildings and the mid 20th century Friends' Meeting House. A splendid tea was served at Holy Trinity Church, Link Top, where we able to enjoy the fine Victorian wall paintings and stained glass.

Constitution:

Trust Deed dated 21 October 1993, as amended by a Deed of Variation dated 23 November 2005.

Objects:

- 1. The preservation, repair, maintenance, improvement, upkeep or beautification of any Christian church within either the Church of England Diocese of Worcester or the County of Worcester;
- 2. The education of the public in the history and architecture of churches.

Trustees:

New Trustees are appointed by the serving Trustees. The total number of Trustees shall not exceed eleven. There is a sub-Committee for the running of the Cycle Ride that has one member who is not a Trustee. There is also a Sub-Committee for the arrangements of events. Decisions are made by the Trustees at their quarterly meetings. Administration is carried out between meetings by the Secretary in accordance with guidelines agreed from time to time. The Trust is affiliated with the National Churches Trust (Registered Charity Number: 1119845).

Policy:

The Trust has no permanent endowment and distributes the income. Apart from reimbursement of some expenses, no payments are made to Trustees.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

All requests for grants must be made through our Secretary who, providing the project meets our criteria, will forward an application form for completion. A considerable amount of information is requested both in relation to the scope and specification of the project, and the profile and financial position of the parish. Applications are considered at the quarterly Trustee meetings when provisional grants are agreed and then confirmation of the grant is subsequently given following a satisfactory visit to the church by a Trustee.

The grant reservation is normally held for a maximum period of twelve months and payment will only be made following receipt of an architect's interim certificate or an appropriate invoice.

During the year, the Trust approved provisional grants to fourteen churches, totalling £58,500. We paid out £33,500 to nine churches (five of them approved for grants in 2010). A further eleven grants remain to be paid, totalling £44,500.
